

Report of the ALHR Business and Human Rights Sub-Committee Year in Review

ALHR's BHR Sub-Committee, chaired by **Amy Sinclair**, was launched in September 2015. It has attracted a strong membership base, comprising 70 lawyers, academics and law students, in Australia and beyond, with a keen interest in business and human rights issues.

It has been a busy first year for the BHR Sub-Committee, with lots of exciting projects completed and underway:

Supply Chains Event

The BHR Sub-Committee organised an <u>event</u> in October 2015 on human rights in the supply chains of Australian businesses, hosted by Ashurst, Sydney. It attracted a wide-ranging audience and generated much interest.

Projects

UN OHCHR's Corporate Accountability and Remedy Project

Members of ALHR's BHR Sub-Committee prepared a comprehensive Submission in response to the UN's Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights 'Corporate Accountability and Remedy Project'. Eleven ALHR members participated in the Project which also involved external contributors, including the Australian Human Rights Commission and two major legal practices.

National Action Plan on Business and Human Rights

The BHR Sub-Committee has been, and continues to be, highly active in advocating for implementation of the <u>UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights</u> in Australia. In particular, the BHR Sub-Committee has done extensive work in advocating for the adoption of a National Action Plan to implement the UN Guiding Principles.

In February 2016, the BHR Sub-Committee released a Policy Paper with detailed recommendations for the Australian Government on a National Action Plan to implement the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights. Amy, together with a team of eleven BHR Sub-Committee members, produced the publication.

In March 2016, the Australian Government announced its intention to hold public consultations on Australia's implementation of the UN Guiding Principles later in the year.

In May, ALHR participated in a Civil Society Roundtable meeting led by the Australian Human Rights Commission and Human Rights Law Centre in preparation for the public consultations. The May Civil Society Roundtable was very fruitful and resulted in a comprehensive set of recommendations for the Government.

A paper setting out civil society's recommendations (<u>Implementing the UN Guiding Principles on</u> <u>Business and Human Rights in Australia: Joint Civil Society Statement</u>) was submitted to the Government following the Roundtable.

The Joint Statement should assist in shaping the agenda for the upcoming public consultations.

Advocacy in relation to a NAP for Australia remains a key focus of the BHR Sub-Committee. ALHR looks forward to participating in multi-stakeholder efforts to drive the agenda forward in 2016-17 and to improving Australia's standing in this area.
