I am a barrister and have been in private practice at the NSW Bar for 28 years. I enjoy taking cases with strong social justice issues and regularly contribute pro bono representation in cases with social justice and civil rights implications.

My particular interest is in legislative overreach affecting civil liberties and government accountability issues. Since 2001 the Australian government has become more secretive, less accountable and with greater and more intrusive powers of surveillance, detention, control and data matching. Combined with lack of transparency of political donations, use under the former LNP coalition government of opaque 'no bid' contracts and abuse of government grants for political purposes and insufficient investigative mechanisms for public corruption, these developments present significant risks to democracy and human rights in Australia.

In the same period, the government treatment of refugees and asylum-seekers and our indigenous and migrant populations also worsened.

Growing threats presented by far-right hate groups at home and abroad and the largely uncharted, unrepresentative rise of evangelical "prosperity theology" religious power in domestic politics presents dangers to civil society we had hoped we had left behind in 1945.

It is hoped the new Labor government will restore accountability and governance standards but there is a need for organisations like ALHR to continue to advocate strongly for improvements in transparency and the constraint of state and corporate surveillance and the exercise of other intrusive powers.

In short, there has never been greater need for the work of the ALHR. I would be pleased to continue to assist that work in whatever role would be most helpful to the Association.
